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Transcript of Merchant's letter referring to the fire

Honoured Mr Courthop I must beg your p[ar]don if I write noncence for I am in a sad condicion, my house burnt and all my other houses in London to [th]e valew of 150^{ll} p[er] Annum but as to your Accompts & business all is safe only I have 500 in S[i]r Robert viners hands how they have dispos[e]d of their Cash I know not but will make enquiry that soe I may supply your occasion as long as I am able you shalbe sure to leave from me next weeke, and I hope to satisfie your desires, but truly Slilr here is the saddest place that ever was seen and I believe there is not one house standing within [th]e walls except some few at Leadenhall Street & ffanchurch Streete it is still burning, and when it will cease none knows for [th]e french Preists have a world of fireballs which they scatter up & downe in all places I saw one of their Balls this morning and thence was taken 3 Bushells of them soe that we can not be safe any where till thes p[er]sons are destroyd which I hope his Ma[jes]ty will see done I have nothing more but th[i]s I shall ever be yo[u]r devoted servant Hump[hrey] Tuck[ey] Desolacion Sept 6 66
